Doctrine 58 [Part 5: Redemption | Doctrine 5]: Christ as Sacrifice

There are several signs, symbols, and pointers in the Old Testament that foreshadowed Christ as being the sacrificial Lamb of God who would take away the sins of the world. However, unlike the sacrificial system of the Old Testament, whose sacrifices were unable to take away sin (Heb. 10:4), Christ's sacrifice on the cross was able to permanently, "once and for all," take away sins.

From the Bible

Hebrews 10:1-4 (NKJV)

- **1** For the law, having a shadow of the good things to come, and not the very image of the things, can never with these same sacrifices, which they offer continually year by year, make those who approach perfect.
- **2** For then would they not have ceased to be offered? For the worshipers, once purified, would have had no more consciousness of sins.
- **3** But in those sacrifices there is a reminder of sins every year.
- **4** For it is not possible that the blood of bulls and goats could take away sins.

Hebrews 10:10 (NKJV)

10 By that will we have been sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all.

Isaiah 53:1-5 (NKJV)

- 1 Who has believed our report? And to whom has the arm of the Lord been revealed?
- **2** For He shall grow up before Him as a tender plant, And as a root out of dry ground. He has no form or comeliness; And when we see Him, There is no beauty that we should desire Him.
- **3** He is despised and rejected by men, A Man of sorrows and acquainted with grief. And we hid, as it were, our faces from Him; He was despised, and we did not esteem Him.
- **4** Surely He has borne our griefs And carried our sorrows; Yet we esteemed Him stricken, Smitten by God, and afflicted.
- **5** But He was wounded for our transgressions, He was bruised for our iniquities; The chastisement for our peace was upon Him, And by His stripes we are healed.

Genesis 3:15 (NKJV)

15 And I will put enmity Between you and the woman, And between your seed and her Seed; He shall bruise your head, And you shall bruise His heel."

John 1:29 (NKJV)

29 The next day John saw Jesus coming toward him, and said, "Behold! The Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world!

Matthew 20:28 (NKJV)

28 just as the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life a ransom for many."

1 Peter 3:18 (NKJV)

18 For Christ also suffered once for sins, the just for the unjust, that He might bring us to God, being put to death in the flesh but made alive by the Spirit,

1 Peter 2:24 (NKJV)

24 who Himself bore our sins in His own body on the tree, that we, having died to sins, might live for righteousness—by whose stripes you were healed.

1 Corinthians 15:3-4 (NKJV)

3 For I delivered to you first of all that which I also received: that Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures,

4 and that He was buried, and that He rose again the third day according to the Scriptures,

John 3:16 (NKJV)

16 For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life.

John 15:13 (NKJV)

13 Greater love has no one than this, than to lay down one's life for his friends.

Key Thoughts

When it comes to absorbing the punishment for our sins, there are two options:

- 1. We can pay for our own sins (many choose this)
- 2. We can allow someone else to pay for our sins (most of us have chosen this)

The sacrificial system of Israel was only a temporary reprieve and was really designed to point Israel to a Messiah who would permanently take away sin's punishment on the behalf of the people.

John the Baptist, Jesus, Peter, and Paul all recognized and clearly communicated that Jesus was that Messiah who would be the substitute.

Far from cruelty, Jesus' substitution was an act of love.
